

High-Dosage Tutoring Funding Guide

for Ohio Schools and Districts



High-Dosage Tutoring (HDT), also called High-Impact Tutoring (HIT), is an intervention shown to help students make significant, accelerated learning gains.

This guide provides an overview of funding sources for HDT/HIT initiatives in Ohio—beyond Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER).

Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Funding

<u>Title I-A</u> funding helps low-income schools improve achievement of educationally disadvantaged students and supports funding for "components of a personalized learning approach, which may include high-quality academic tutoring."

Schools and districts receiving Title I-A grants can deploy high-dosage tutoring through two avenues:

- Schoolwide programs that aim to enhance the overall education supports at a school serving an eligible population of low-income students and families.
- Targeted assistance programs intended to support qualifying student populations struggling to meet State academic standards.

<u>Title IV-B</u> funding is available to enable communities to establish or expand centers that provide additional student learning opportunities aimed at improving student academic outcomes.

Title IV-B emphasizes complementary activities that reinforce schoolday programs and support expanded learning time programs, providing students with at least 300 additional program hours. This funding can help underserved populations overcome academic challenges.



State-Specific Funding

Ohio has unique funding streams dedicated to education initiatives, including HDT/HIT programs.

Ohio State-Funded High-Quality Tutoring Program

Ohio school districts may apply for <u>state-funded high-quality tutoring</u> <u>program</u> support. Tutoring programs will be offered at no direct cost to participating districts or schools.

All of those participating must commit to participation criteria that align with best practices for high-quality tutoring, as evidenced by the <u>Six Key Components of High-Quality Tutoring</u>, and using one of the vendors in Ohio's approved <u>Vendor Directory</u>, including The Princeton Review®/Tutor.com.

The Foundation is dedicated to measurably enhancing education "inside and outside the classroom." It has allocated \$17 million toward supporting student achievement and academic recovery in 2024. This includes expanding out-of-school time opportunities and designating \$7 million for HIT programming to accelerate learning gains.


