

Top 5 Classroom Tasks: One Week Before Launch

Launching a new initiative in the classroom requires careful preparation to ensure a seamless experience. By conducting a mock high-dosage tutoring session and reviewing best practices for both students and teachers, you can proactively address potential challenges in integrating high-dosage tutoring into the classroom.



The week before your high-dosage tutoring sessions are scheduled to begin, prepare by following these 5 key steps:

1. Schedule a Dry Run
Organize a practice session with your high-dosage tutoring students. This will help them get comfortable with the process and interface before any official sessions start.

2. Prepare the Environment
Have students gather their devices and headphones and settle students in the designated spot you've chosen for tutoring.

3. Log in to Tutor.com
Guide students to the high-dosage tutoring tab and ensure they know where to find their sessions.

5. Set Behavioral Norms for Tutoring Sessions
Laying the groundwork for appropriate behavior during high-dosage tutoring sessions can help students stay on task. Brainstorm appropriate behavioral expectations with students, establish clear guidelines, create a collaborative student contract, practice routines, and positively reinforce good behavior.
